
Naples jazz, food, films, classical say one thing: Stay in May

Of all many things that recommend the Stay in May Festival — the diversity of arts, the food, the wellness events — one of its most sparkling attributes is how excited its presenters are about what they're doing.

Judy Copeland has been at the helm of its Short Films Fest, three nights of 15- to 25-minute films, and she is enthusiastic about every film that's on the schedule.

"This is a terrific film," she said of "Échappé," the opening night headliner about a young Soviet ballerina who becomes increasingly aware during a New York dance tour that her brother is planning to defect.

"It's a thriller, it's got ballet, it's won awards. It's got Russian — it's mostly English but there's a little Russian (with subtitles) in it," she said. The film dances to its tense

ending in a quick 13 minutes. It won "festival favorite" at the San Francisco IndieFest, best short film of the Sedona International Film Festival in Arizona and best short film at the Golden Door International Film Festival of Jersey City, New Jersey.

But she's similarly excited about "Coin Lunch," the tale of an American man trying to find his place in a Japanese culture without the money that makes friends. As it progresses, the main character must choose: Go out with the guys, or stick to the budget his wife has set.

"You can see him agonize over the choices. That's a wonderful film," she declared. "The cinematography is exquisite." It also won an award — audience choice, short film — at the Monmouth Festival in Red Bank, New Jersey.

In fact, just about all the films Copeland chooses have won awards somewhere.

"In regular festivals they can show 10 shorts in one block because they have more time And inevitably one's a clunker. But they have room for that, " she said. "We always have three films and discussion, so obviously I'm very careful about my choices."

Further, she said, the Stay in May Festival audience is "mature. They ask fabulous questions. I've had directors attend and tell me this audience asked the best questions they'd ever gotten."

Two of the directors will be here for the festival this year: Robert Haufrecht from New York, for "Subterranean Love: Ileana and Paul," on Sunday, Aprll 28, and Jeffery T. Schultz from Chicago for "Easy Way Out" on Sunday, May 5.

Misty Drake is a another Neapolitan involved in the festival, as a performer in the Henry Mancini Institute String Trio concert at 2 p.m. Saturday, April 27. While the name of the institute may evoke the movie and TV themes for which the late composer of "Moon River" and "Peter Gunn" was famous, its mission is stretch its scholars' boundaries, according to Drake.

So the trio she's with is digging into some less traditional fare of Richard Strauss and Hubert Parry along with Beethoven's String Trio No. 9 in G Major. But what excites Drake, a masters student in violin at the Frost School of Music in Miami, is coming home to perform as an adult.

She has played in the Naples Youth Philharmonic and with the student-led Anderson String Quartet during her years growing up in Naples.

"I'd always wanted to come back and give concerts in the community that i grew up in and was so supportive of me — it was something I always hoped to do," she said. "I can't believe it's already happening."

The festival opened this week and continues through May 7, with everything from an evening of New Orleans jazz to an afternoon of cooking, pottery painting and food and a special Naples Art District open house. A list of events is in the accompanying schedule.
